Notes:

1. All full-year courses must be successfully completed in order for credit to be earned. Full-year courses may not be dropped at mid-year for half credit.
2. Students in Grade 11 carry a program of six subjects, including one elective, Physics or another elective, and P.E.
3. Grade 12 students in good standing have no mandated courses (except the PE requirement), but must carry at least two electives in the High School. In addition to course work in the High School, a Grade 12 student may undertake other approved work or study experience. A senior must take a total of six or seven classes including P.E.
4. Students may audit a course, if their schedule permits, and with the permission of the instructor. Students auditing classes are expected to attend all class sessions and do all assigned work. Students who meet these requirements receive a January/June report card grade of "AUD". This grade carries no credit, but does appear on the student's transcript.
5. Teaching Internships, Independent Study, and Hunter College courses are open only to Grade 12 students, with permission of the Department Chair and the individual teacher. Forms are available in the Programming and Departmental offices. Hunter Scholars Program is only open to seniors. Seniors who wish to take courses at Hunter College must contact the Hunter Scholars Program Coordinator.

Scheduling for 2009-2010

Important Dates

January 7, 2009: Dr. Maurer conducts special mandatory assembly for 11th grade students regarding Hunter Scholars Program, OCC and Internship courses for 2009-2010.

February 13, 2009: 2009-2010 Course Catalog available online, in the Counseling offices and in the Assistant Principals' offices.

February 13, 2009: Dr. Rogutsky and Dr. Fisher conduct a joint assembly for current 10th and 11th grade students at which they receive the Course Selection Handbook, the Course Selection Sheet for 11th or 12th Grade and other necessary selection materials. Students must have these forms for registration, including any necessary signatures for courses requiring pre-approval. At this time, current 11th grade students will also receive their Counselor assignment.

February – March, 2009: Members of the Class of 2010 meet with their new counselor to discuss course options for the Fall. At this meeting, each student receives his or her transcript through tenth grade. **Members of the Class of 2010 must have a counselor signature on their registration form.**

February – March, 2009: Members of the Class of 2011 meet individually with Ms. Martin to discuss course options for the Fall.

Additional course selection materials are available in Room 240.

March, 2009: Current 9th Grade students fill out Art/Music Selection Sheets for 10th Grade.

March 30 – April 3, 2009: Scheduling days for current 10th and 11th grade students. Bubble sheets completed in auditorium with Chairs, Counselors and Staff on hand to assist. Students ***must*** have course selections properly completed to fill in bubble sheets.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION - GRADES 11 & 12

- Students must take a one Physical Education class in the Fall and the Spring.

- Courses meet on and off campus. (OC) designates an off campus course. Students that do not take at least one off campus course during the year must take an “open” PE course and successfully pass it in order to receive credit for PE.
- Selectives may change according to student enrollment and/or facility availability. Therefore, each student should select THREE choices per semester.
- **If a course has already been taken and successfully passed you may not take it again.**
- **Varsity Team members may not take an elective of the same activity as their sport.**

COURSES THAT REQUIRE FEES (APPROXIMATED AND MAY VARY), PRE-REQUISITES OR OTHER SUPPLEMENTARY NEEDS:

- Lifeguard Training – Must be able to swim 300 yards using a combination of front crawl, breast and side strokes. \$60 fee for certification and materials. This class is scheduled as a triple period with a CPR/AED certification component. A pre-test and department approval is required.
- Water Polo – Must be able to swim 200 yards of front crawl and tread water for 2 minutes
- Bowling - \$5 per session (\$75 is approximate depending on the number class meetings)
- Fencing - \$5 per session (\$75 is approximate depending on the number class meetings)
- Rock Climbing - \$50 Fee is approximate
- Camping/Canoeing - \$75 fee is approximate. Department Approval required.
- Racquetball – Must provide racquet and goggles (\$30+ to be purchased at sporting goods stores)
- Inline and Ice Skating - must provide their own inline skates, helmet and pads. The ice-skating portion requires a per session fee of approximately \$2.00. Ice skates may be rented for approximately \$4.75 per session. Department approval is required.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT ANTICIPATES A MANDATORY \$30 STUDENT ACTIVITIES FEE FOR ALL STUDENTS WHICH WILL REDUCE AND POSSIBLY ELIMINATE THE ABOVE CLASS FEES.
